Also, if you do not normally pay a prescription charge, pharmacies are able to provide you with advice and/or medicines for minor conditions free of charge.

# How does the scheme work?

All you need to do is visit your local community pharmacy.

# What information will I be asked for in the pharmacy?

You will be asked about your symptoms and any other medication you might be taking, in order to give you the correct advice.

You will be advised the best way to manage your symptoms.

The minor ailments scheme covers a range of short term treatments (see list). You may need to be sent back to your GP if more treatment is necessary or if the condition is not covered by the scheme.

If appropriate, you will be supplied with medicine to treat your symptoms.
